ITEM 22: Report by the **2025-2026** Committee Chairs and Community Liaisons:

A. Standing Committees

1. Outreach/Community Affairs – Wendy G. Thum – There was no meeting in February due to the holiday. Two motions have been added to the agenda.
2. Finance and Budget – Alison Patch - Budget council file to track: **26-0600** (provided by Cristina Cosgrove, VANC)
3. Beautification – Cindy I. Valle – Held the February meeting in which we had a presentation from Lily Lee to prepare for the Tree Care Event on February 28. The event went great! We worked on 13 trees. We cleaned the wells, removed lots of trash and weed, and applied mulch. I thank the board members who attended the event: Rosalío, Daniel, and Norma. We thank Karen from Empower LA for joining us and working hard along us. We look forward to more involvement from the rest of the Board. Phase II will take place on March 21 and Phase III, and last phase, on March 28. I am currently working on bringing the Volunteers Cleaning Communities (VCC) organization to our Beautification Committee to discuss pointers on improving outreach.

4. Planning and Land Use (PLUM) – Held the PLUM meeting for February and provided lots of updates on approved projects and notices of demolition received. Two motions were added to the agenda to support the project on Sun Valley Climate Resilience and an ADU at the LA Baptist Church. At our March 26 meeting, we will be reviewing an application by Alliance MIT to approve a ten feet fence and an addition to their building.
5. Emergency Preparedness – Eddie Venegas – We held the February meeting with a very informative presentation by the Alzheimer’s Association on *The Impact of Alzheimer’s and Dementia in Our Community*. We are currently working on our coming Emergency Preparedness Workshop in partnership with the Sun Valley Branch Library on April 11 from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm. Norma and I met with the librarian and filled out the required paperwork. They are very excited about this project and are preparing their swag for the event. We are reaching out to the agencies and elected officials who will be joining us to booth.

B. Ad Hoc Committees:

1. Environmental and CHSR – Wendy G. Thum
2. Homelessness – Monica Vacas
3. Bylaws – Norma O. Chávez – There is a motion in the agenda to amend the bylaws to allow for board member selections given that the City Clerk is proposing using the elections funds to balance the budget and have terms remain for a couple more years. We were unable to meet as a committee with such short notice after learning about this budget proposal. We will meet to update the bylaws and add more changes to the Standing Rules.
4. Elections – Norma O. Chávez – Discussed at LANCC and VANC (Cristina Cosgrove)
 - A. Neighborhood Council Election Update – City Council & Ballot Timeline: Key meetings occur between March–June, before the commission wraps up, City Attorney must finalize ballot language by end of July. Final City Council meeting before recess is July 3; recess begins July 7. Neighborhood councils urged to stay engaged and use the VANC agenda to track updates.
 - B. City Clerk’s Proposal & Election Postponement: City Clerk proposed postponing NC elections to 2029 due to budget constraints. A \$915,000 allocation exists for hybrid elections in 2026, but the clerk recommended using it to balance their budget instead. This would extend NC board terms by two years. There is a major concern regarding lack of communication from the City Clerk’s office about this proposal. Budget Advocates met with departments, including the City Clerk, but were not informed about the election-postponement recommendation. Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) requested outreach funding assuming elections would occur in 2027. The Mayor’s office will ultimately decide whether NC elections occur. City Council will act only after the Mayor releases the budget. Mayor’s reelection considerations may influence the decision. NCs encouraged to contact: The Mayor, Councilmembers, and the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners
5. SABER – Norma O. Chávez – There was no meeting for the month of February. The next project has been discussed at previous meetings to plan the Sun Valley Earth Day celebration with a San Fernando Rd Cleanup on April 25 from 8:00 am to 12:00 pm with a resource fair from 11:00 am to 12:00 pm. It seems that we will be working Council District 2 to clean Hollywood Way to Sunland Blvd. We will be staging at Arminta St. We would like to get the schools involved. We also want to partner with the Beautification committee for this event so we can plan it together.

C. City-wide community liaisons:

1. LANCC – Norma O. Chávez – Motions in the agenda. Next meeting on Saturday, March 7, 2026. I hope to be able to attend or listen as I will be tabling at the Hermoso Respiro Event in Council District 2.
2. VANC – Cristina Cosgrove – I attended my first meeting and brought the following information:
 - A. There was a presentation from the *The Valley Economic Alliance* regarding their history, mission, focus area and their business assistance program. Visit <https://thevalley.net/> for full details.

- B. Rob Quan** shared information regarding the **Charter Reform**: LA City Charter changes require voter approval, the 13-member Charter Reform Commission is advisory only, recommendations must be submitted to City Council by April 2. The Commission was created in June 2024; members appointed shortly after. Major challenges: tight timeline limiting deliberation, lack of staffing power and limited authority over staff, Mayor's office influence over process and staffing. The Commission's four main issue areas: government structure, better government, planning & infrastructure, budget & personnel. Neighborhood councils were initially excluded; now included but only minor technical changes have been recommended so far. Public participation is essential, especially for neighborhood councils. Process has been convoluted, with pre-planned motions and issues around public comment. Next major meeting on the 18th (possibly shifting to the 19th) is critical for NC-related recommendations. Neighborhood councils encouraged to: attend in person, submit written public Comments, submit CIS statements to ensure their voices are heard.
- C. Budget Recommendations & Elevating Budget Issues**: budget recommendations presented on September 13 were unanimously approved by the working group, strong push to include this language in motions to reinforce budget advocates' recommendations, and emphasis on elevating the city budget as a core issue tied to broader citywide challenges and reforms.

6. C-PAB – Norma O. Chávez, Rosalío García (alternate) – Applications to the CPAB are done every year so the committee has shrunk from 19 members to 11 members. The new Board has voted to hold bimonthly meetings with the community and the other months meet as committees for some time to see if those meetings become more effective and less repetitious of information. The task at the moment is to recruit more community members so the board can then be divided into committees based on the needs of the community.
7. Homelessness Liaison – Monica Vacas
8. NCSA – Sam Khalaf
9. LADWP- NC MOU – William Leiva – At the January and February LADWP committee meetings, a proposed irrigation and lawn assistance program was discussed. The program, which is still in development and pending funding approval, would: fully fund front lawn replacement for qualifying households, apply to households earning under \$55,000 annually, replace existing sprinkler systems and current grass, not applicable to business owners, be administered through the Department of Water and Power. At this time, the program is still being processed and finalized.

RE: Request for Support in Including Sun Valley Station in the Metrolink \$5 LA Zone Pass

Dear Council Member Imelda Padilla and Council Member Adrin Nazarian,

On behalf of the Sun Valley Area Neighborhood Council (SVANC), which represents the more than 40,000 residents and community of Sun Valley in the City of Los Angeles, we respectfully request your support in advocating for the inclusion of Sun Valley Station in the Metrolink \$5 LA Zone pass program. We are asking that you engage directly with Los Angeles County Supervisor Kathryn Barger, who serves on the Metrolink Board of Directors, and with Metrolink CEO Darren M. Kettle, to champion this change on our community’s behalf.

The \$5 LA Zone currently serves eight stations across the greater Los Angeles area, providing affordable transit access to thousands of daily commuters. We are requesting what amounts to a small and logical adjustment: adding **Sun Valley Station** to this network. At only 1.7 miles north of **Burbank Airport – North Station**, which is already included in the \$5 LA Zone, the Sun Valley Station is a natural geographic fit for this program. The distance between these two stations is negligible 1.7 miles — and yet, that gap in coverage means Sun Valley residents who travel to downtown would have no other choice than to buy the SoCal Day Pass, which cost \$15, triple the price.

A Matter of Equity and Access

Sun Valley neighborhood is a predominantly working-class community, home to many families and individuals who are highly price-sensitive when it comes to transportation costs and who actively lobby for more accessible public transit options. The \$5 flat fare is not simply a convenience — for many of our residents, it is the difference between choosing transit over a car or forgoing the trip altogether. Excluding Sun Valley Station from this program, while our neighboring city of Burbank has three stations included, sends an unintended message that affordability initiatives do not extend equitably to all communities in the region and, worst, Sun Valley is literally not “worth the trip.”

An Opportunity to Grow Ridership

We understand that Sun Valley Station currently experiences among the lower ridership numbers within the Metrolink network. Rather than viewing this as a reason to exclude the station from fare incentives, we believe it is precisely the reason to include it. Fare reduction is one of the most direct and proven levers for stimulating ridership growth. Including Sun Valley Station in the \$5 LA Zone pass would give

price-sensitive commuters a direct reason to leave their cars at home. The station also has a free on-site parking lot with capacity for park-and-ride commuters from across the northeast San Fernando Valley — a built-in advantage that other stations in the program lack. The ridership upside here is not speculative; it is waiting.

Environmental and Regional Benefits

The Sun Valley neighborhood sits within the San Fernando Valley, where vehicle emissions and traffic congestion remain persistent challenges. Every new Metrolink rider represents one fewer car on the road. The \$5 LA Zone pass is one of the most tangible tools available for advancing the City's climate commitments, and Sun Valley is exactly where that tool should be applied. Given the station's proximity to Burbank Airport – North, the incremental program cost of adding it would be negligible. The return — in emissions reduced, miles avoided, and community benefit — would not be.

We respectfully ask that you contact Supervisor Barger and Metrolink CEO Darren M. Kettle directly to urge that Sun Valley Station be added to the \$5 LA Zone pass. The case is straightforward: the geography supports it, the community needs it, and the ridership potential is there. Sun Valley residents should not have to pay a premium to access the same network as their Burbank neighbors two miles down the track. Your voice as City Council representatives carries weight in this conversation, and we are grateful for your willingness to carry it.

We welcome the opportunity to discuss this request further and are available at your convenience. Thank you for your continued leadership and your commitment to the residents of Sun Valley.

The Sun Valley Area Neighborhood Council supports the project because it will provide housing to pastors of their church. We believe that having people living in the property helps reduce vandalism and crime.

We do recommend that when construction begins, if a canvas is used to cover the fence that the give regular maintenance to the area. Graffiti takes over fences at properties under construction and create an unwelcoming environment for the community and becomes an incentive for other people to vandalize the property.
